NEW TERM, NEW LEARNING

We have started the New Year and term well with all children focussed on their learning. CURRICULUM COOKING

We are excited that Curriculum Cooking is starting this term led by Miss Scott. This will be a series of classroom based learning alongside practical cooking sessions in smaller groups. We have recently purchased a new cooker and look forward to the delights the children will be producing!
